ORDINANCE # 120

## DISORDERLY PERSONS

Any person of sufficient ability, who shall refuse or neglect to support his family; any common prostitute; any window peeper; any person who engages in illegal occupation or business; any person who shall be drunk or intoxicated or engaged in any indecent or obscene conduct in any public place; any vagrant; any person found begging in a public place; any person found loitering in a house of ill-fame or prostitution, or place where prostitution or lewdness is practiced, encouraged or allowed; any person who shall knowingly loiter in or about any place where an illegal occupation or business is being conducted; any person who shall loiter in or about police stations, police headquarters building, county jail, hospital, court building or any other public building or place for the purpose of soliciting employment of legal services and/or the services of sureties upon criminal recognizances; any person who shall be found jostling or roughly crowding people unnecessarily in a public place, shall be deemed a disorderly person.

## SAME: PUNISHMENT.

Any person convicted of being a disorderly person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Any person who shall be convicted a second time of being a disorderly person, the offense, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding 100 dollars and costs of prosecution or by imprisonment in the county jail or the Detroit house of correction not less than 30 days nor more than 3 months, or by such imprisonment and by a fine not exceeding 100 dollars and costs of prosecution; and for a third and all subsequent convictions the offense being charged as a third or subsequent conviction, such person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment in the Detroit house of correction, in the State House of Correction and reformatory at Ionia or in the State House of Correction and branch of the state prison in the upper peninsula at Marquette, not less than 6 months nor more than 2 years, or by such imprisonment and by a fine not exceeding 100 dollars and costs of prosecution.
